Given the current need and demand, at local, provincial, national, and international levels for scholarly activity pertaining to critical issues of crime and justice, the current collaboratively created Strategic Plan focuses on six key strategic commitments for the next three years. These commitments include enhanced interdisciplinarity, increased internal and external collaborations, enhanced financial and operational self-sufficiency, increased Indigenous collaborations, enhanced leadership in existing areas of strengths (e.g., risk assessment of justice involved people, mental health and addictions, etc.) and elevated focus on new areas of focus including patient-oriented research, and sharing research findings more broadly.
