

- Determine the purpose of the data commons and ensure it is grounded in a strong framework.
- Determine the primary audiences for contributing and analyzing the data commons.
- Resources must be sought to directly support participating agencies.
- Establish a team for developing data commons with expertise.
- Determine the level of data that will be targeted by the data commons

Overarching Questions

- 1. What types of justice-related data related to civil and family law are being collected by legal and non-legal organizations in Saskatchewan?
- 2. To what extent are agencies in Saskatchewan practicing within the domains of civil and family law able to share data with external parties?
- 3. What is the perceived need, benefits, and challenges for a justice data commons in Saskatchewan?
